Monthly Message

In the world beyond coastal Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama, the arrival of Ash Wednesday and Lent must come as a complete surprise, for the rhythm of life includes Christmas and perhaps the celebration of the Wise Men on Epiphany. Period. Nothing more until Ash Wednesday, or perhaps a pancake supper on the eve before.

But not in our world. Mardi Gras starts slowly, and in the days between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday builds up to a frenzy.

Whew! By the time Ash Wednesday arrives, we are often glad to get on our knees in fervent prayer, confessing our sin, and to be reminded of our humanity with a smudge of ashes on our foreheads.

We are in the midst of the mortification of the flesh and doing good works in preparation for Holy Week and Lent.

I'm reminded of the admonition of Father John Andrew, late Rector of St Thomas Church on 5th Avenue in New York who always greeted people during this season with, "I hope that you are having a hard Lent."

There is something else, generally unsaid, that Lent does for us in Louisiana: It reminds us that we are not just members of St John's or of Trinity, but also of the Church-at-large.

Annually, Bishop Morris Thompson selects a Lenten book for us to all read together, not just in your parish, but in the whole diocese.

Weekly, the Bishop sends reflections for all of us to consider.

This year, his selection is an important little book with the grim title of Autopsy of a Deceased Church. It's the subtitle which gives hope: 12 Ways to Keep Yours Alive.

If you are not reading this yet, it's readily available. Get it. Join in with other members of the Diocese. Think about Bishop Thompson's reflections, and discuss how to keep your parish alive.

Easter Wings

Lord, who createdst man in wealth and store,
Though foolishly he lost the same,
Decaying more and more,
Till he became
Most poore:
With thee
O let me rise
As larks, harmoniously,
And sing this day thy victories:
Then shall the fall further the flight in me.



My tender age in sorrow did beginne
And still with sicknesses and shame.
Thou didst so punish sinne,
That I became
Most thinne.
With thee
Let me combine,
And feel thy victorie:
For, if I imp my wing on thine,
Affliction shall advance the flight in me.

by George Herbert (1593-1633), Anglican priest and poet

For Herbert's life, see the note to his poem "Prayer I" in the January 2019 newsletter.

Lines 1-2: Eden and the Fall. Lines 7-9: Larks sing as they soar very high up the sky. Line 19, imp: to repair a damaged feather... by attaching part of a new feather; to graft.

From an online source: "Herbert's poetry may be referred to the 16th century tradition of the *emblem*, which combines a motto with a simple symbolic picture and poetic explanation, as well as, in the case of 'Easter Wings,' the example of Greek *shaped* poetry. The poem's two-stanzas were originally formatted sideways across opposite pages on its first publication, making the likeness to two sets of wings more obvious. . . . [but] 'Easter Wings' [is] printed upright in modern type. 'Easter Wings' is a religious meditation that focuses on the atonement of Jesus Christ. -Its celebration of bodily and spiritual resurrection draws its theme from 1 Corinthians 15, and it is especially notable that the word 'victory' found in the Biblical text is repeated in both stanzas of the poem. As well as the poem's being emblematic of the redeemed soul overall, the expansion and contraction of the lines imitates the meaning of the words. Thus, in the first stanza the line 'O let me rise' occurs as the wing unfurls again and is answered by the theme of climbing in the second. There is also similar imitative wording at the center of both stanzas, 'Till he became / Most poore' in the first being answered by 'That I became / Most thinne' in the second."

It may also be noted that stanza 1 is on the general human condition after the Fall whereas stanza 2 focuses on Herbert alone.




What does Easter celebrate?

- "O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR VICTORY?"
 O DEATH, WHERE IS YOUR STING?"
 1 Corinthians 15:55
- The most glorious season of Easter celebrates the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from dead.
- This great event, for Christians, occurred on the third day after Jesus' crucifixion around A.D. 33.
- The early church perceived his resurrection as the central witness to a new act of God in history and the victory of God in vindicating Jesus as the Messiah.
- The resurrection of Christ is the cornerstone upon which faith is built, the connecting link between the Old and New Testament' witness of God's redeeming works.
- This event marks the central faith confession of the Church and was the focal point for Christian worship, observed on the first day of each week since the first century (Acts 20:7)
